

Meredith Thurman Reneau was the son of Isaac Tipton Alexander Reneau and Clarissa M. Blowers Reneau. He was born Dec. 24, 1895 in Broken Bow, Nebraska. Meredith was a superlative athlete in football, basketball, track and swimming, winning various trophies. He next attended the University of Nebraska. It was during this time that World War I Draft

Registration took place. Below is a copy the Registration Card that Meredith completed.

In August, 1917, the Rainbow Division was formed at the University. Meredith immediately enlisted, and after training in upper New York State, he shipped out of Plattsburg, NY for France. He was in the 165th Infantry Regiment. Later he transferred to the Army Air Corps as a Sergeant Mechanic and machine gunner. After the Armistice he went to Germany with the army of occupation. He came home after his discharge somewhat shattered by the war and suffered from stomach ulcers, severe headaches and insomnia for the remainder of his life.

On June 22, 1926, Meredith married Carolyn Mary Johnson in Davenport, NE. He met Caroline when she was studying at the University of Nebraska to become a teacher. She taught in one room country school houses along the Kansas-Nebraska line, Later she went to teach in a one room schoolhouse on ranchland near Flagler, Colorado. Meredith and Carolyn moved to Denver, CO in 1956, where Meredith worked for the University of Denver Security Dept. until his death on Dec. 9, 1974. Carolyn Johnson Reneau passed away on Mar 11, 1993 and is buried with Meredith in the US War Veterans Cemetery in Denver, CO.

Meredith and Carolyn Reneau had four children, three surviving: **Robert**, Denver, CO; **William**, San Antonio, TX; and **Jeanine Reneau Chitwood**, Kersey, CO. A son, **Meredith Thurman Reneau Jr**. was born in 1929 and died in 1945.

After obtaining a Master of Social Work degree from Our Lady of the Lake University in San Antonio, he worked as a counselor with the Travis County Sheriff's Office. We remember: General Jesse Lee Reno



Jesse Lee Reno was born June 20, 1823 in Wheeling, Virginia, (now West Virginia). He graduated from West Point in 1846. After graduation, he served in the Mexican War. He returned to West Point and became an assistant professor.

Jesse Reno was already in the army when the Civil War broke out in 1861. He was promoted to Major

General in 1862, and was at the Second Battle of Manassas. Even though the Union Army lost the battle, Reno's force performed well, delaying the Confederate advance long enough for many other Union troops to withdraw to safety. Following the battle, Robert E. Lee took his army into Maryland, aiming ultimately for Pennsylvania. General Reno's command was part of the Union Army that came from Washington D.C. in pursuit of Lee. Lee used South Mountain as a buffer, blocking the gaps and passes of the mountain to slow or delay the Union Army pursuit. Fierce fighting was at South Mountain, Maryland, where Union troops fought to gain passage through gaps and passes in the mountains. General Reno was killed Sep 14, 1862, at Fox Gap, South Mountain, Maryland.

Jesse Reno's lineage is: Lewis Thomas Reno, Charles, Benjamin, John, Lewis Jr., Lewis Sr. Jesse married Mary Bradley Beanes Cross on Nov. 1 1853 in Washington D.C. There were five children born to this union: Lewis, born 1844 in Philadelphia, PA and died in 1863 at age 8; Marion Reno, born about 1856 in Philadelphia, PA and lived 6 months; Alexander Reno, born Feb 1848 in Washington D.C. and died at age 3 months. Two of the children lived to adulthood: Conrad Reno, born Dec 28, 1859 in Mt. Vernon, AL and died May 7, 1933 in Daytona Beach, FL; Jesse Wilford was born Aug 4, 1861 in Leavenworth, KS and died June 2, 1947, Pelham Manor, NY. Conrad married Susan M. Eustis on April 13, 1887. Jesse Wilford married Marie G. Snowman on Jan 15, 1901. Both Conrad and Jesse did not have children.

HONORING General Reno...

Among the towns named in honor of General Jesse Lee Reno is El Reno, OK, nearby historic Fort Reno, and Reno NV.

Historic Fort Reno, Oklahoma

Historic Fort Reno is located four miles west of El Reno, OK on Route 66.

Fort Reno began as an Oklahoma Territory Military Post in 1874. It was named "Fort Reno" in 1876 by General Phil Sheridan, in honor of his classmate at West Point, Major General Jesse L. Reno who was killed in the Civil War at the Battle of South Mountain in Maryland. The cavalry and infantry stationed at Fort Reno played an important role in

the transition of the area from Indian Territory status to

Oklahoma statehood in 1907. Troops from Fort Reno supervised the first great Land Run of 1889 that opened the unassigned lands for settlement.

The Fort also served as one of two remount depots from 1908 through 1947 when the lands were transferred to the United States

Department of Agriculture for an agricultural research station. In 1997 the USDA agreed to the establishment of the Fort Reno Visitor Center as a non profit entity to provide historical information to the public and coordinate fundraising efforts to preserve and rehabilitate the historic structures at Fort Reno.

Among activities that take place at the fort are: "Christmas at the Fort," a celebration of cultures includes the firing of the Christmas guns, carols, Christmas treats; "Fort Reno Candlelight Tour," where reenactors portray individuals who lived at or visited Historic Fort Reno during the different phases of its existence from 1874 to the present. Participants are also able to visit historic camps on the parade grounds; and "Tombstone Tales" where visitors take a journey back to the days of the cavalry and Indian scouts during the Fort Reno Tombstone Tales event and hear stories about the excitement and tragedy of life on the prairie as told by historical reenactors in the Old Post Cemetery.

The town was named El Reno in 1868, with the "El" added to the name to differentiate the town from Fort Reno. Today the town boasts many historic homes and structures, along with events throughout the year honoring its rich heritage.

El Reno residents look forward to celebrating Oklahoma's 100th Birthday on Nov. 16, 2007. The RENO MONUMENT & CENTENNIAL SOCIETY is

dedicated to support all festive events, beautification and heritage, programs for this celebration. Specifically, the Society had the prime responsibility for design and construction of a monument dedicated to El Reno's namesake, Civil War hero, Major General Jesse Lee Reno.

Reno, Nevada

Reno is known as "the biggest little city in the world." However, there is much more to Reno than gaming and entertainment: Reno has a reputation for its arts and culture community, as well as its dedication to preserving the history of the community. In 2004, the Reno City Council was given the opportunity to purchase documents from the city's namesake, Union General Jesse Reno. The originals are housed at the Nevada Historical Society and

reproductions are displayed in the Reno City Hall.

Also in 2004 an organizing committee, named Jesse L Reno, Memorial, Inc., made up of Reno City employees, began a project to commemorate the man after whom the city was named. Local artist





Chris Atcheson, in photo on the left, was commissioned to create a life size bronzed

statue of the General. The statue was funded by donations and the city, along with the sale of a few "maquettesmalls" (smaller replicas of the statue, as pictured above.) On

May 29, 2006, the statue was placed at Powning Park in downtown Reno.

There is a biographical plaque that accompanies the statue. It includes a history of how the town came to be named after General Reno, and a biography of the General. Noting how the town became known as Reno, it states: "In 1868, Lake's Crossing, a growing community along the Truckee River in Northern Nevada, was parceled into a proper town site by the Central Pacific Railroad. The railroad named the town Reno, to honor Major General Jesse Lee Reno.

At the 3rd Annual National Reno/Reneau Family Reunion, **Leigh Wimberly**, Leesville, LA spearheaded a drive to fund a plaque to accompany General Reno's statue. It states, Reno/Reneau Family of America – 1688, noting the year that our immigrant ancestor, Lewis Reno, arrived in the colonies.

Author adopted by Reno/Reneau Family

During the 2006 All Reno/Reneau Family Reunion in Kentucky, attendees voted to "adopt" William F. McConnell, Reno, NV, author of the book, Remember Reno. The idea for the adoption came from Leigh Wimberly, who wanted to honor Mr. McConnell and his wife, Louise, for their interest in the Reno family, specifically, General Jesse Reno. McConnell's book is a biography of General Reno, and is a great read for anyone who would like to know this Civil War hero better.

On July 12, 2006, the Reno NV City Council presented William and Louise with an adoption certificate which read:

CERTIFICATE OF ADOPTION

Members of the Reno/Reneau Family of America, descendents of Lewis Reno, Huguenot Emigrant to the Virginia Colony in 1688, meeting for the Third National Reno/Reneau Family Reunion, in Albany Kentucky, hereby announce the adoption of each of two persons into the family.

For their dedication, devotion and contributions to the history of our illustrious kinsman, General Jesse Lee Reno, they have endeared themselves to all Reno/Reneau descendants. They have expanded our knowledge of our place in destiny and have tied us all together, with the loving ribbons of kinship which make us proud.

William F. McConnell and Louise McConnell now residents in the city of Reno, Nevada

are now members of our family and take their special place in our history, a part of our heritage from this day forward. They are related to us, just as we are related to one another.

Done this 9th day of June 2006 in Albany, Kentucky Upon receiving the document, William McConnell expressed his appreciation to the Reno/Reneau Family, to **Steve Hardesty** and **Chris Good**, both of Reno, NV, and the City Council for their interest and work in recognizing General Reno with the statue in Memorial Park.
